^{*} Helen (Bryan) Johnson is a Leech Lake Band member whose challenge to Minnesota's attempt to tax her Leech Lake trailer resulted in the landmark *Bryan v. Itasca County* decision. Ms. Johnson maintained that the state had no power to tax the onreservation personal property of tribal members. The United States Supreme Court agreed. Even more importantly, the Court held that Public Law 280 did not give states general civil regulatory jurisdiction over reservations. Without this precedent, today's tribal gaming industry, which sparked a resurgence of economic and community development in Indian Country, might not exist.



Minnesota American Indian Bar Association (MAIBA) Membership Classification and Application

Regular: Regular members are persons who are (i) enrolled members of any Indian tribe or band, or persons who are recognized by their Indian community of residence or origin as being Indian, and (ii) admitted to and in good standing with any state bar association. Regular members are eligible to vote and to hold office or directorship in MAIBA, and have all other rights, privileges, and duties attendant to membership in MAIBA. **Dues for regular members are \$35 per year.**

Associate: Associate members are persons who are (i) enrolled members of any Indian tribe or band, or persons who are recognized by their Indian community of residence or origin as being Indian, and (ii) who are law students or law school graduates not admitted to the bar, or persons who have regular assignments or duties as advocates, prosecutors or judicial officers in tribal courts. Associate members are not eligible to vote, hold office or serve as directors in MAIBA, except as provided in Article V, Section 2 of the MAIBA Bylaws. Associate members have all other rights, privileges, and duties attendant to membership in MAIBA. **Dues for associate members are \$15 per year.**

Special: Special members are those persons interested in the law directly relating to Indians who are not eligible for regular or associate membership but are members in good standing in any state bar association, are law school graduates not admitted to the bar, or are law students. Special members are not eligible to vote, hold office or serve as directors in MAIBA, but have all other rights, privileges, and duties attendant to membership in MAIBA. **Dues for special members are \$35 per year.**
