DECLARATION OF WILLIAM P. TORNGREN

- I, William P. Torngren, declare:
- 1. I am a Deputy Attorney General employed by the California Department of Justice. Office of the Attorney General, and am one of the attorneys of record for plaintiff State of California (State) in this action. I am an attorney duly licensed, and admitted, to practice before all courts within the State of California. I have personal knowledge of the facts set forth below and if called as a witness, I could, and would, competently testify to them.
- 2. The State commenced this action by filing a complaint on June 17, 2014, along with pleadings requesting a temporary restraining order. The State's complaint alleged, among things, that: an intra-tribal dispute existed among the members of defendant Paskenta Band of Nomlaki Indians (Paskenta or Tribe), a federally recognized Indian tribe; the intra-tribal dispute involved armed factions thus posing an imminent threat to the public health, safety, and welfare; and the alleged acts and omissions breached the class III gaming compact (Compact) between the Tribe and the State.
- 3. The intra-tribal dispute involved two groups, each of which claimed tribal leadership rights and the right to possession and control of the Rolling Hills Casino (Casino) located in Corning, California. For purposes of this declaration, the groups are referred to as the Freeman Group, which is represented by Rosette LLP, and the Swearinger Group, which is represented by Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP.
- 4. After a hearing in which all parties participated, the Court issued a temporary restraining order and set a preliminary injunction hearing. The emergency relief sought by the State was intended to be the least intrusive and most neutral order that maintained the status quo and protected the public health, safety, and welfare. On the date and at the time set for hearing the State's preliminary injunction request, the parties advised the Court that they had reached a stipulation. The Court entered an Order Granting Preliminary Injunction (Order) as a result of that stipulation. The Court stayed all other proceedings pending a status conference on October 2, 2014. Consequently, no responsive pleading has been filed with respect to the State's complaint.

- 5. The Order provides, in part, "[t]his preliminary injunction will remain in effect until resolution of the case by settlement or judgment or the court's further order."
- 6. In anticipation of the scheduled status conference, I spoke with attorneys for both the Freeman Group and the Swearinger Group. As a result of those conversations, I prepared and circulated a draft stipulation under which the parties agreed to, among others, dismissal of the State's action without prejudice, dismissal of the Swearinger Group's third-party action without prejudice, and dissolution of the preliminary injunction.
- 7. With certain suggested changes, the Swearinger Group agreed with the draft stipulation.
- 8. On September 30, 2014, the attorneys for the Freeman Group, however, advised that the Freeman Group did not agree with the draft stipulation. Instead, they requested that the State agree to extending the preliminary injunction. The reason given for that request was that over the September 27-28 weekend, a fight occurred in which the stepson of Andrew Freeman, the Freeman Group's leader, was injured. I later learned that the fight was at a bar in Chico, California. The Order does not pertain to any lands located in Chico or Butte County.
- 9. I reviewed documents submitted by the Tribe to the State. I have received reports from the Tehama County Sheriff, as well as other law enforcement agencies, with respect to conditions at the Casino. Those reports and the Tribe's documents uniformly advise that a tribal election was conducted on September 13, 2014, to determine the Tribe's Tribal Council. A neutral third-party election monitor supervised the tribal election. The election resulted in the Freeman Group being installed as Tribal Council.
- 10. I am advised, and understand, that no incidents involving law enforcement and related to the intra-tribal dispute occurred before, during, or after the September 13th election. I further am advised, and understand, that an orderly transition to the newly elected Tribal Council has occurred.
- 11. Based upon the information that I have received and my consultations with state and local officials, I believe that the preliminary injunction has served its purpose, which was to preserve the peace and prevent further escalation of conditions that existed in June 2014. As a

result of complying with the preliminary injunction, the September 13th election, and the orderly transition to the newly elected Tribal Council, the Tribe appears to have cured the alleged breach of the Compact. Finally, despite a bar fight in Chico, I am not aware of any imminent threat to the public health, safety, and welfare in the Casino's vicinity or on lands covered by the Order. Nor has any law enforcement agency reported any such threat. 12. In view of the foregoing, the State respectfully requests that this Court dismiss the State's action without prejudice and dissolve the preliminary injunction.
